

Requirements

1. Contribute to the World Friendship Fund (National) or the World Scouting Contributions (Council) through your crew. Learn how this money is used to help Scouts in other parts of the world (There is no minimum contribution).
2. As an individual or with other members of your crew take a trip to another country, including a visit to one of their Scout activity centers and participation in an activity with one of their Scout units. (Individuals or groups traveling abroad should apply for an "International Letter of Introduction" from the BSA International Division. Applications are available at the Council Service Center.)
3. Host an individual or group of foreign students at a dinner, a meeting or a campout weekend where activities are planned so that you learn about their country/countries.
4. Learn about the World Organization of Scouting Movement (WOSM). Make a display to share what you learned with others.
5. Participate in an International Scout Jamboree/Camporee (either in the US or another country) or other International Scout event. Share your experiences with another Scout unit.
6. Complete one year of foreign language, or earn the interpreter strip.
7. Participate in a pen pal program with a Scout in another country. Share your experience with your crew.
8. Host a Scout (or group of Scouts) from another country who is (are) living or on tour in your area.
9. Find out about the Baden Powell House and the Kandersteg International Scout Centre, Gilwell or Brownsea Island. Make a display to share what you learned with others.
10. Participate in a Jamboree-on-the-Air
11. Visit a Foreign Embassy or Consulate and find out about their Scouting program if possible or about their country in general. Share your experience with your unit.
